Dear Friends

Reflecting on how much importance we should attach to attending Sunday Services at our Meeting Houses poses a tricky question! Attendance at Catholic worship has apparently held up better than at most main stream Protestant Services. This may be of course due to one of the tenets of the Catholic faith being that every Sunday should be considered as a day of "holy obligation", an expectation of attending Mass every week.

In contrast, our Unitarian tradition has been and is that we neither prosletyse nor pressurize people to attend services: it is a matter of personal choice. Highly valid reasons for not coming to the Meeting House on a Sunday may include being unwell or upholding commitments to spend time with family who are deserving of all the love that can be given. If we feel like going for a walk in the woods on a Sunday then the chances are we should do so. Frankly, we rightly value our individual freedoms.

The American Unitarian poet, essayist and Transcentalist, Ralph Waldo Emerson (1803 -1882), proposed that a person was just as likely to come in touch with the divine by communing with nature as by listening to a Unitarian sermon. However, Emerson also said this:

A person will worship something, have no doubt about that. We may think our tribute is paid in secret in the dark recesses of our hearts, but it will come out. That which dominates our imagination and our thoughts will determine our lives and our character. Therefore it behooves us to be careful what we worship, for what we are worshipping, we are becoming.

As a Minister I feel that congregating regularly is "essential' - because it challenges us to ask ourselves, 'What it is we are worshipping or centering our thoughts on?' 'Can this time be used to re-orient ourselves so that our worship/meditation is worthily focused? Are we aware of the thoughts and needs of others and of wider community and world issues?' The discipline of regularly coming together can strengthen our resolve to grow , share with and support one another in following our Unitarian traditions, which value involvement in endeavour to promote and establish social justice, mutual understanding and to make more visible the standards we try to uphold through practicing our Unitarian faith in the local community and further afield.

A wry witticism comes to mind. An Irishman, finding himself in one sticky situation after another, when asked to describe his predicament, says "Well, it's desperate but not serious". This reply can be taken to resonate with the Sunday low attendances at our Meeting Houses. Congregations may be small which in itself is not "serious". However, the work of the minister and maintaining facilities together with contributions to the community at large, are the same whether there are 5 or 50 members attending. The burden so often falls on the core of the few who if "overloaded" can at times find themselves feeling "desperate". Sufficient members to share Services and to work alongside each other is an 'essential' for a valid faith community.

If we find ourselves without a good reason *not* to attend, we should come to the Meeting House on a Sunday. Remember.... for Unitarians attending Sunday services will never be compulsory.... only (sometimes) essential.
